They are faithful and uncompromising in their loyalty to Christ, His Truth, and His church. Such have caught a vision of the greatness of the church and by God's grace are growing daily more toward the likeness of Christ. There are no greater or better people on the earth than devout members of Christ's church. It should be counted among one's highest privileges to be a part of this wonderful family. Membership in the New Testament church is truly a foretaste of Heaven.

The church is great because of its destiny. There is only one word to describe the destiny of Jesus' church: eternal. Every plant which God did not plant shall be uprooted, especially every religious plant (Mat. 15:13). Jesus said that even the gates of Hades could not prevail against His church (Mat. 16:18).
